SUNDAY 7 SEPT CREATIONTIDE



Garden of Peace Issish 82:14-18

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God." (Matthew 5:9)

Creationtide is a month of unity where Christians from around the world celebrate the wonderful creation which we are part of, and look to care for our common home. This year, we are called to be peacemakers with creation, all people and God.

The prophet Isaiah pictured the desolated Creation without peace because of the lack of justice and the broken relationship between God and humankind (Isaiah 32:14-18). This description of devastated cities and wastelands eloquently stresses the fact that human destructive behaviours have a negative impact on the Earth. We see this destruction around us in climate chaos as wildfires spread, floods rise, storms rage and droughts devastate; this is echoed in global biodiversity loss, sea-level rise, plastic pollution and increased migration from uninhabitable lands. Broken relationships are further exacerbated by political inaction and wilful destruction.

As people of faith, we are called to be peacemakers where we seek reconciliation between the broken land and humanity, who were blessed to care for all creation. In this we have hope – a hope, based on the reconciliation of all things to God by Jesus, that creation will find peace when justice is restored. To hope in

a biblical context does not mean to stand still and feel sad or overwhelmed, but to act, pray, change, and reconcile with Creation and the Creator in unity, repentance and solidarity.

This Creationtide:

- Lament for the destruction we see:
- Pray for God's peace where there is suffering because of climate change;
- Pray for God's peace within decisions made by governments and multinational companies;
- Pray for God's peace within the Church of England's Net Zero Carbon project;
- And become an Eco Peacemaker by supporting and championing your church's Eco Church journey and your local community.

SUNDAY 14 SEPT EDUCATION SUNDAY



There are lots of reasons to be disheartened and discouraged within the education system; a SEND crisis meaning that pupils often do not always get the support they desperately need, decreasing pupil numbers causing uncertainty for the smallest schools and increasingly difficult financial situations. Schools can be very difficult places to work; staff often feel like they are spinning lots of plates, and sometimes perhaps feel like that is not always happening successfully. And yet, despite that rather bleak picture, there is joy to be found everyday within school halls, within classrooms and out in the school playground. As schools start back after a long summer break, there will be excitement in the reunion of friends who may not have seen each other for 6 weeks, Collective Worships speaking of hope and dreams for the year ahead and teachers working hard to ensure that the plans for the new year are in place and offer a wide variety of opportunities for children and young people. In the middle of difficult circumstances and struggles, we can always experience joy and gratitude for the things in front of us, if we choose to focus on it. Within Church of England Schools, pupils and staff experience distinctively Christian worship where they get to experience something of the person of Jesus Christ every single day. That is no small thing! Jesus Christ, who came into a world of brokenness and division to save it and



bring hope, is the same person who our pupils and staff get to hear about every day. It is comforting, therefore, that in the difficulties that schools do face, there is a message of hope that is portrayed and the invitation to explore a God who is for them and not against them. Verse 8 from Psalm 16 below, reminds us of the confidence that can be had when we have the message of God in our hearts and minds.

I keep my eyes always on the LORD. With him at my right hand, I will not be shaken.

Prayer points

- For all school leaders that they will have strength and compassion at the start of a new academic year.
- That everyone within school communities feel hopeful for the new year ahead and see the joy that can be found every day.
- For all schools facing difficulties in the year ahead – pray for wisdom as decisions are made and navigated.

Fairtrade Fortnight: 22nd September until 5th October

"Since Jesus asks us as Christians to love our neighbours as ourselves, and our neighbour is any other human being with whom we come into contact, the demand to love must prevail when we shop."

It comes down to this. When we buy any product, we're not just buying a thing on a shelf. Behind it are people – the people who grew, processed, and crafted what we see. We come into contact with them even if we will never directly meet them. They are our neighbours.

That means we have to care about their lives - were they paid enough for their work? Do their families have access to schooling and food? Are they free to ask for good working conditions? Protected from environmental harm? If we love our neighbours, we need to do everything we can to ensure that the answer to these questions is 'yes'.

Fair Trade is one way of caring. During Fairtrade Fortnight,22 September – 5 October, our churches can explore what Fairtrade is and does, celebrate what it's accomplished, pray for it, encourage people to get involved – and enjoy wonderful Fairtrade products.

We can celebrate the Fortnight by committing or recommitting to be a Fairtrade place of worship. There are only two criteria:

 To use Fairtrade products wherever possible (at least tea, coffee and sugar) and share information about Fairtrade products with the wider congregation. To integrate Fairtrade into the life of our places of worship, at Fairtrade Fortnight or other times of the year, for example through events, stalls and worship.

Prayer for us to be agents of change:

Dear Lord, please give us hearts yearning for the changes that manifest your Kingdom: justice in matters large and small, the love that cares for neighbours, a closer walk with you as we follow your ways. **Amen.**

Dear Lord, please give us minds that strive to understand, your Word and our world so that we can hear your call in the situations we encounter and the choices we have to make. **Amen.**

Dear Lord, please give us eyes that see the world as you do, lips that speak words of truth and love, hands and feet that take action, and strength to persevere that, changed by your Spirit, we may become agents of change, through whom you reveal your Kingdom for the honour and glory of your name. **Amen**.

SUNDAY 5 OCT BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Instituted in 1987, Black History Month allows us to collectively share, celebrate and understand the impact of Black heritage and culture, and how it has made our society in the UK fuller. This could be through Black people in ministry, academia, music, food or invention – to name a few.

Yet, how do we commemorate Black History Month in our diocese? I would firstly suggest ensuring we are listening, understanding and including those from Black communities in our regular services and church decision-making.

Secondly, interacting and attending the various Black History Month events that will be happening throughout the diocese this month – Black History Month is not for one group of people!



Lastly, here are some prayer pointers to help quide us through the month:

Week 1: Thanking God for the unique and consistent contributions that Black clergy, staff and church members have made within our churches, both locally and nationally.

Week 3: That God would continue to heal the racial prejudices and hurt that have been experienced by our Black colleagues and friends, both in society and within religious spaces.

Week 4: A prayer for the racial justice work of the diocese, that it may offer specialised support, encouragement and training that will make Leicestershire a place where people of Black heritage thrive and fulfil their God-give purpose.

Week 5: That the work of the Racial Justice Unit, in the national church, will continue to grow and impact change on a larger scale.

SUNDAY 12 OCT WORLD HOMELESS DAY



Like many social issues today, homelessness can, sadly, become mired in politics, not helped by the rise in populism and the trend on social media, where everyone thinks they know the answer. Friends at the Hope Forum, which is our local homelessness lived experience group, will soon disillusion you of that. Tackling homelessness requires a multi-faceted co-ordinated approach, shared by governments (local and national), agencies, local communities and a whole range of specialist organisations. We are quietly proud that here in Leicester (and this is developing also in the County) this kind of hope-filled partnership exists, in the form of our Homelessness Charter.

Let's remind ourselves that, while this is a pressing national issue, it is also a very live and arguably even more sharp an issue elsewhere in the world. World Habitat, whose vision is quite simply 'a world where everyone has a safe and secure home' is an international organisation whose headquarters are here in Leicester. Their work as an international housing network centres around sharing and developing good practice – from which we have learnt. Their awards this year have gone to very diverse projects across the world - in Tanzania, Argentina, UK, Slovakia, Algeria, Australia, Austria, El Salvador and Pakistan

We remain sharply focussed locally on increasing and diversifying the housing provision. Hotel and

B&B accommodation, while better than nothing is woefully inadequate. Putting on hold any sense of being able to rebuild lives. Other 'live' current developments include better support for families in this kind of accommodation, joined up working to support refugees who achieve the right to remain here, but then struggle with the next steps, strategies around work and skills and closer working partnership with various arms of the NHS. And more.

Anyone is welcome to our annual service of lament for homelessness – where folks, including many from the homeless community, gather to remember friends who have died homeless and to reflect, lament and pray around the situations which still trouble us today. The service is at the Cathedral on Friday 15th October 2025 at 5.30pm.

The cells are extremely hot especially at night when everyone is locked up. Sleep is difficult, the prisoners talk to each other through the walls while others try to sleep and become cross at the noisy chatter. This cause tempers to raise and verbal fights. Lack of sleep is not a good start to anyone's day. Prison life must continue, the regime adhered to.

It is not just weather that affects the prisons. They have lost their liberty many have lost their families and friends. They have lost direction, and some have lost their faith.

Chaplains of many faiths bring that much needed help and prayer to all prisoners. The hope that they need. Most prisoners just want to off load their troubles without being judged. Always asking for prayer and guidance and hope.

In many countries prisoners have no access to a Chaplain they rely on local missionaries and priests. These visits will be very infrequent, we pray for comfort, for listening and for hope for prisoners in these situations.

Our world is troubled with wars. There are hostages, prisoners of war and many innocent

people trapped in places where they cannot escape. Please pray for them.

As you pray reflect on your life and how very different it is to those imprisoned. Pray for the difficulties they endure everyday and ask God to be with them guiding them with His grace.

SUNDAY 2 NOV INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE PERSECUTED CHURCH

Every year, on the first Sunday of November, we observe the International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church, and this year it takes place on 2 November, 2025.



Research shows that one in seven believers worldwide faces severe persecution. Stand with these brave individuals who pay a high price for their faith through the power of prayer.

Not long ago, I had an enlightening conversation with a cab driver AKLILU (name changed) from Eritrea.

This Orthodox Christian bravely left his homeland due to religious persecution, and his journey is a testament to faith, resilience, and hope in the face of adversity.

AKLILU explained how Eritrea, which was once primarily a Christian country, has experienced changes that have severely limited religious freedom. As a Christian, he faced significant oppression, which ultimately led him to flee to England and seek asylum.

AKLILU spoke about his lively church community in Leicester, where they gather for worship at for services which start as early as 4 AM, with priests arriving even earlier to greet the congregation. These four to five-hour services are filled with prayer, worship, and teaching, providing a fulfilling spiritual experience. He emphasised that the time or inconvenience doesn't matter to them. What matters is the opportunity to be in God's presence and to worship together as a community.

What struck me deeply was his unwavering faith. Despite the uncertainty, the hardship of leaving his home, and the challenges of starting over in a new land, his trust in God has remained firm.

This conversation prompted me to contemplate the broader landscape of religious freedom, both in Eritrea and on a global scale. The recent murders of Indian pastors, coupled with the

imprisonment of evangelists and the rise of anticonversion laws across various nations, pose a grave concern for believers everywhere.

Let us earnestly pray for the Christians in nations like Eritrea, where they grapple not only with relentless persecution from the state but also with deep-seated internal divisions and a resistance to new expressions of faith among the younger generation. In contrast, in countries like the UK, where freedom of religion is cherished, fresh challenges arise amid increasing diversity of faiths and a growing tide of secularism. Many immigrants arrive with the hopeful dream of practicing their faith freely but find themselves disillusioned by the spiritual decline and indifference that surrounds them.

AKLILU story is not just about one man, but about a community of believers who have endured suffering and yet remain steadfast in their faith. May we never take for granted the freedom to worship, and may we support those who are still fighting to have that right.

It is a call to pray for Eritrea, for those facing persecution, for unity among Christians, and for a revival of faith in lands where it once flourished.



Maranatha - "Our Lord, come"

The Advent season invites us to celebrate the birth of Jesus while renewing our hope in His promised return. Our thoughts centre on Jesus Christ — His redemptive power, His healing love, and His just care for all creation. Advent is more than remembering a past event; it is living in the joyful expectation that Christ will come again to gather His people, heal the nations, and bring peace to the world.

Across cultures, Advent is marked by a mix of joy, repentance, spiritual reflection, and preparation of the heart to welcome Christ as Saviour. The cry of the early Church — Maranatha, "Come, Lord Jesus" — remains our prayer today.

The birth of Jesus came at a time of deep socioeconomic inequality, political corruption, and distorted religious values. Yet God took the initiative, sending His Son into this brokenness. Through His life, words, and works, Jesus transformed challenges into opportunities, gathering disciples and sending them to proclaim the Good News and establish a new way of life rooted in God's love for all

Jesus healed and reconciled by praying, speaking truth in love, and serving sacrificially. He sought out the marginalised and the weak, cared for both sinners and the sinned-against, and revealed the nature of God's kingdom.

The prophet Isaiah envisioned a world where "swords shall be beaten into ploughshares" and "nation shall not lift up sword against nation" (Isaiah 2:1–5). This hope still shapes our prayers today.

As Advent begins the new liturgical year, we continue to pray for:

The Call to Repentance

Today's Gospel (Matt.3:1-12) introduces us to John the Baptist, the strange Elijah-like figure, whose task is to prepare people for the imminent arrival of Jesus of Nazareth, whose ministry in turn will indicate through his words and actions that the promised Kingdom of God is breaking in on the scene.

At a time when we are 'preparing for Christmas'... food shopping, present buying, arranging travelling or getting ready to welcome relatives, John's preparation is in a different league all together. His is much more about an urgent call to do a top-to-bottom radical clearing out of our lives. As a starter of a checklist of what the values of the coming Kingdom will look like, just have a look at the Beatitudes in Matthew 5:1-12, or, when you feel ready, the more radical version in Luke 6:20-26! These Beatitudes have been an inspiration and a challenge to countless generations of Christians across so many languages and cultures, and now it's our turn!

I have a number of people who come to me from this and our neighbouring diocese for Spiritual Direction. Recently, with some of them, we have started to explore what my own Spiritual Director has encouraged me to engage with: when in the Lord's Prayer we pray

for the coming of the Kingdom, where are the signs of the Kingdom, as exemplified in the Beatitudes, in our own lives?

Repentance isn't about saying sorry...
there's another word for that..." contrition".
Repentance is about the redirection of our
lives, our thoughts and behaviour, to be signs
of the Kingdom. I recall working in the Taizé
Community in Burgundy, as a student,
50+ years ago, exploring with an international
group what being the People of the Beatitudes
would look like. I am still working on it!

Advent 3

Traditionally in the Anglican calendar, this Sunday focuses on John the Baptist. In the wider Christian world the theme is joy – and the two seem a little incompatible! John must have been fearsome and extreme – yet folk flocked to him. Because for them – the ordinary people – he offered a hope and promise of something different from the oppression they experienced. Making the religious and political elite edgy. People power being dangerous. But we shouldn't think of John in negative terms. He really wanted something different to happen. And he knew it was round the corner with Jesus.

The reading from Isaiah for today is so full of hope and joy – indeed that latter word is mentioned four times in ten verses! It was written when the Hebrew kingdom was under threat and its leaders not responding particularly astutely. Nor paying attention to God's steer. A text for our times. Not that all our current global leaders are inept or self-seeking, but surely a reminder against short termism and personal agendas.

As I write, I don't know what the situation in the various global 'hotspots' will be when you read

this. But I do know that many ordinary folk are fearful of even reading the news today, given the suffering and instability it conveys. Yet, as Christians, we should, like John, Jesus and all the prophets, face head on what we know to be happening around us. We may or may not have influence, but we can, with them, lament and indeed, be angry. And we can pray and use our voices appropriately.

There is an urgency about John which we can surely identify with, given the precarious situation humanity is in in so many ways – environmental, political, economic... Advent is surely the time to throw off any complacency and re-engage – in whatever way God calls us.

'Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel', which means, 'God is with us.'

(Matthew 1.23)

The wonderful news that 'God is with us' through the birth of Jesus bursts with the promise of joy and hope. As we draw nearer to the day of his birth, our focus turns to Mary. In her wonderful willingness to serve God, Mary shows extraordinary faithfulness and courage. As she carries Jesus, she surrounds him with total love and devotion, protecting and nourishing him as he grows and develops, until the time is right for him to enter the world.

In her poem 'Advent', Jessica Powers (1905 – 1988) writes: 'I live my Advent in the womb of Mary... I wait in Mary-darkness, faith's walled place, with hope's expectance of nativity.' Powers invites us to imagine ourselves carried by Mary in a place of allencompassing love and faithfulness, a place of safety and stillness in which something amazing is beginning. Rather than trying to rush through to Christmas, we too can be safely held during this time of waiting, encouraged and nourished in our own continued spiritual growth and discipleship, growing in faith in the loving presence of God and reflecting on the power of the hope that Jesus' birth offers us.

In the darkness and cold of winter, in the chaos of our festive preparations, this can be a stressful and challenging time. But even when we feel alone, distant or distracted, God is still with us. Powers concludes her poem with the reflection that it is through her Advent in the 'womb' that she discovers 'earth's most amazing knowledge: someone is hidden in this dark with me'. The presence of God draws close to us, wherever we are.

I pray that as we continue to prepare our hearts and minds for Jesus' birth, that we will each know the beauty of God being with us today, even in the most challenging or unexpected of places.

The Escape to Egypt
